Completion Ceremony for the New Ofunato Fish Market

A Symbol of the Revitalization of the Fisheries Industry!

Ofunato

On Wednesday, April 23, a completion ceremony for the construction of the new fish market was held in Ofunato.

It was in 2009 that construction on a new fish market began. The previous building was very old and needed a replacement. In 2011, however, the construction site was damaged in the Great East Japan Earthquake and Tsunami, putting the project on hold for a year. Construction was needed to raise the ground that had sunken due to the wave, and as a result the project took a total of five years.

There were about 300 people attending the ceremony, including Governor Tasso and Mayor Toda, along with those involved in the fisheries industry and the construction of the market.

"The revived fish market will be a symbol of the reconstruction of Ofunato," said Mayor Toda in his speech. "I believe this will increase our fish haul and promote our product branding efforts."

Following this, there was a ribbon-cutting that took place in front of a fishing boat with colorful fishing flags raised, and the new market was officially opened.

The 4-story reinforced concrete structure has a total floor area of around 16,500 square meters. The new fish market has high freshness and sanitation standards, and there is also a facility that produces thinly shaved ice for packing fish. There is an exhibition area, a viewing deck and an observation deck that the whole family can enjoy. With facilities such as these it is hoped that in addition to facilitating commerce the fish market will become a hub for the tourism industry.

"Cover the Town in Cherry Trees" Event Held in Yamada

On Sunday, April 20, the "Cover the Town in Cherry Trees" event took place in the Autocamp Funakoshi Family Travel Park in Yamada. The event was organized by the Yamada municipal government and BG Ura-no-Hama Group.

Participants in the event included local Yamada residents and volunteers from around the country. They planted around 200 cherry saplings on the slopes of hills in the area.

The goal of this project is to create popular flower-viewing sites above the line where the tsunami hit in 2011, and since last year the project has seen some 530 cherry trees planted.

At the planting ceremony, the Mayor Shinitsu Sato gave an address in which he stated that it had been a terrible loss that so many of the

town's carefully grown cherry trees had been lost in the disaster. He also expressed his hope that with the planting of new cherry trees they could honor the memory of those who died in the tsunami.

White Base Otsuchi Business Hotel Opens

A cozy hotel on the coast, good for long-term visits

On Thursday, April 17, the White Base Otsuchi business hotel opened in the Kirikiri area of Otsuchi.

The facility was built to fill the need for accommodation facilities. which are lacking in the town. It will be open for a 5-year period, and is run by the company Reconstruction Community Development

All rooms in the facility are single rooms. It consists of four two-story buildings, of which three (52 rooms) are intended for long-term, principally male, visitors, and the remaining building (25 rooms) is intended for tourists and those on short trips home, and includes a bath and toilet in each room. A total of 77 people can be accommodated at any one time.

The hotel has a cafeteria supplying local foods, as well as a booth selling regional goods. There is also a communal bath for long-term guests, which heats the water using the same wood-burning stove that was used in the Kirikiri evacuation shelter after the tsunami.

"I hope people will make use of this facility as a place to relax and also to engage in various activities," says Mitsuru Ishii, assistant manager of the Management & Planning Division of Reconstruction Community Development Otsuchi. "We will be using it to organize events and using every opportunity to interact with the local people. I hope that this hotel will make people who stay here want to come back to Otsuchi again."
