Shinji Kagawa (playing for Japan in 2014 FIFA World Cup) visits Rikuzentakata

On May 13 (Tuesday), Manchester United midfielder Shinji Kagawa visited Rikuzentakata to see first-hand how reconstruction in the affected region is progressing, and to express his feelings directly to the people of Tohoku.

After visiting Rikuzentakata's famous "Miracle Lone Pine Tree" he dropped by the soccer club at Rikuzentakata High School and cheered them on. He then made a courtesy call on Rikuzentakata City Hall, and played a friendly soccer match with the kids at Takata Elementary School.

Kagawa spent his junior high and high school years in Sendai, and remarked, "People in Sendai and Tohoku helped me out a lot back then. I hope I can repay that debt now by playing my best soccer game!" He also wrote on his personal blog that he would be thinking of Tohoku's reconstruction while doing his best for Japan in the upcoming FIFA World Cup.

The 2014 World Cup will be held in Brazil, and will take place between Friday, June 13 and Monday, July 14 (Japan

Standard Time). Japan's first match versus Cote D'Ivoire will be on June 15 (Sunday) from 10 a.m.

Special Tree-Planting for the Settai Coastal Defense Forest

Miyako

Iwate's coastal defense forests suffered tremendous damage in the Great East Japan Earthquake and Tsunami. But the Taro-Settai district of Miyako has finished laying the groundwork for the planting of new saplings, and so it has become the first place in Iwate to begin reviving its coastal defense forests.

The planting day was 30° Celsius and it was with sweat on their brows that participants began planting the new trees.

Some of the saplings were grown in Tottori Prefecture in the Chugoku region of southern Japan, using Iwatean seeds, as a form of aid for the affected area. Governor Hirai of Tottori, along with students at the Aimi No. 2 Elementary School in Nanbu Town, Tottori, took part in the event. They planted 1,530 saplings over a 3,000-square-meter area. In about 20 to 30 years' time, these trees will grow up to once again protect Taro from the winds and waves.

A New Rice Brand from the Affected Area

May 18 (Sunday): A planting ceremony for the new "Takata no Yume"-brand rice was held in Yonesaki. Rikuzentakata.

"Takata no Yume" ("the dream of Takata" in Japanese) is derived from Akita-Komachi rice. Thanks to the continued restoration of paddies that were destroyed in the tsunami, this year they can plant over five times last year's crop.

Mr. Chihiro Kinno who runs the paddies told us "The tsunami decimated my crop. I was in despair. But that despair has turned into hope. Our rice is delicious, so please try it!"

Consumers have commented that the taste of the cooked product is sublime, and it's even delicious eaten cold. It sounds just right for a lunchbox!

The rice will be harvested in late September and early October. It will be sold both within Rikuzentakata; distribution venues around Japan are being researched.

We hope that everyone will grow to love Takata no Yume rice, and it will become a symbol of the reconstruction.

She debuted as a jockey at Iwate's Mizusawa Race Track on April 19, 2014. She is the first new female jockey in Iwate in 10 years.
